LAMPE Foundation, founded in 1993, is a community-based, volunteer-managed, not-for-profit organization. It is dedicated to supporting students who have demonstrated their ability to serve their communities as leaders and/or who are training to become bilingual health professionals and who choose to build careers and serve the communities of the Townships. The Foundation is governed by an independent board of directors.

We are dedicated to encouraging women and men from the Eastern Townships and across Canada to continue their education in order to improve their own lives and the wellbeing of the Townships community. We offer financial and mentoring support to students who have demonstrated their ability to become leaders in their community, and to those who are training to become health care professionals in the Townships.

It is hard to believe that spending less than two hours filling out a scholarship application form can lead to a life-changing experience. Yet, several Lampe winners can speak proudly and enthusiastically of their new lives. Some are quietly grateful; others will express their feelings emotionally.

At the persistent urging of teachers at a local elementary school, a fellow teacher's aide, ten years out of school, completed the Lampe application and returned to university with the assistance of Lampe funding. Becoming a Lampe winner launched her into new learning brimming with confidence. She completed her degree, gained employment as a teacher and now explores the world whenever she can.

One health care student earned more than one Lampe award thanks to her diligence in completing the application forms and seeking individuals to reference her work and character. Her children are most grateful to their mother's perseverance in her studies. She loves her new job.

A new Canadian launched an innovative agricultural business thanks to a generous Lampe award. He and his family are now building on ways to expand on their early successes.

Also award recipients from the 1980's and 1990's speak poignantly about the difference access to education has made for them. This is most heart-warming to all of us in the Foundation. One physician, a 1991 winner put it this way, "As I look back now more than twenty years later, it is not so much the money that was important. It is the fact that a group of women I highly respect, chose me. That thought stays with me."

For more than 20 years, the Lampe Foundation has been making a difference through its support of many talented young people who are now providing leadership in their own way to their communities in the Eastern Townships and beyond. Making a Difference in Their Community

he Lampe Foundation is proud to have supported many students achieve their educational dreams.

Read on to see what happened to three promising students after completing their studies.



Manon Guay is a great example of a bilingual young woman navigating motherhood and an exciting career right here in the Townships. With children aged 15, 5 and 1, she returned to work in the fall 2015 as assistant professor in the Department of Rehabilitation in the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences of the University of Sherbrooke.

Growing up, Manon watched her mother return to school to become a nurse while raising her four children, convincing her that it was possible to have it all. She is quick to add that it was her father who encouraged his wife and his children to continue with their studies and reach their career goals.

Graduating McGill in 1992 in occupational therapy, she had always known that she wanted to work in health care but hesitated between physiotherapy, speech therapy and occupational therapy. Occupational therapy's broad focus as well as the practical interventions with clinical practice finally solidified her choice. She encourages young students to select courses that maximize their options. She also suggests taking on volunteer experiences or accompanying a professional to observe first-hand professionals at work.

Remaining connected to the clinical application of her field, Manon's education continued to a Masters in Research in 2008 at the University of Sherbrooke, a Doctorate in Clinical Sciences in 2012 and a post doctorate from the National Institute for Aging with the University of California in 2013. Although she is now also a researcher, manager and professor, she continues to work as a clinician with the home care team at the CSSS Memphremagog providing services to the elderly. She remains fascinated by research into the needs of those over 90 years, a group growing rapidly but for whom little research has been done.

It was during Manon's Masters that she was awarded the **Jan and Diana Kuilman Memorial Scholarship** from the Lampe Foundation. She learned of the scholarship while reviewing potential sources of student financing on the University of Sherbrooke's website. "It was the first time that I had completed an application for a bursary and I had to rewrite the application several times since I wanted to write it in English. This helped me become more comfortable applying for bursaries and was a great learning experience. Now, as a researcher, a large part of my responsibilities involves writing requests

for research grants". She was grateful for the financial help and for being recognized by the Lampe Foundation. Manon is just one of the hard-working and inspiring students that the Lampe Foundation has supported in recent years.

Nathalie Schiebel is currently a technical writer at Ciena in Ottawa. Ciena is a market leader in telecommunications operating in over 60 countries with approximately 4500 professionals across the Americas, Asia and Europe. Its customer base comprises nearly two-thirds of the world's largest service providers, including the world's largest mesh networks, Fortune 2000 global enterprises with a strong track record in mission critical financial and healthcare networks; research and education institutions; and, other essential government agencies, including the world's largest defense network.

Nathalie was a student at Bishop's University studying Honors English with a minor in drama when she was awarded the **Eileen Healy Prize for Leadership** by the Lampe Foundation in 1990. Her studies in English and drama at university gave her experience in studying difficult texts and in researching and writing essays. Prior to Bishop's, Nathalie, a native of Montreal, studied pure and applied science at Vanier College that also prepared her for her future work by making her familiar with technical concepts. She then completed a Master's degree in English at Western and went on to begin a PhD in English at the University of Ottawa.

At Ottawa she was a teaching assistant in a course in technical writing taught by a technical writer at Nortel who was also a part-time professor at the University of Ottawa. The professor needed help with a project on which she was working and offered Nathalie the chance to pursue an opportunity at Nortel. For the first nine months to a year the professor helped her to find the sources she needed and to learn the differences between academic and technical writing. For instance, while academic writing strives for variety of expression, technical writing always uses the same terms to describe the same things and consistently uses active sentences. After two years on contract she had a job with Nortel. When Nortel collapsed in 2001, Nathalie took six years off to have and raise her three children.

According to Nathalie, students pursuing a career in technical writing need to love new things and to find innovative technology fascinating. For instance, advances in physics have increased the speed with which data can be transmitted, with the result that we now get our entertainment from Netflix, rather than at the video store. Technical writers must be able to adapt their research skills to new areas. They need to internalize and synthesize what they have learned through their research in order to be able to explain it in writing. She also advises students to be open to opportunities that may not be exactly what they want. A degree in English or in professional writing has a broad basis that sets them up for a range of possibilities and choices.

Nathalie found her experience in the drama department helpful in learning to cope with deadlines and with stressed-out groups. She also suggests working on a university newspaper or magazine. Through her involvement with the Miter, the literary magazine at Bishop's, she learned about editing and pulling a presentation together. It's important to know how to function as a team and collaborate with colleagues. Nathalie and a fellow student would read their essays aloud to one another. They could catch weak spots in the essays at points when the reader slowed down or faltered.

Nathalie's emphasis on flexibility is related to her view of the long term future in her field. As the interface design of consumer products improves and the products become more intuitive, manuals cease to be necessary. More complex systems like large telecommunications systems still require documentation, though with these too the need will decrease with improvement of design over time. Meanwhile few entry level positions are available, and with the decline of the large Canadian tech companies like Nortel and Research in Motion Canadians are pursuing careers in technology in the United States.

A Conversation with John Poveda*



Lampe: **Tell us about your decision to move to Canada from Columbia**. JP: Before leaving Columbia, we did extensive research on potential places where we could develop our goals as a family and as individuals interested in agriculture. We looked at Australia, New Zealand, Brazil, the USA and Canada. After many hours of research and much family debate we decided that Canada had the most to offer individuals with our profiles and interests.

Lampe: Why did you and your family choose Quebec and, more specifically, the Eastern Townships and Coaticook?

JP: Quebec is by far the best place for a family to establish and develop an agricultural project. There is a strong Union of agricultural producers (UPA), an Agriculture Ministry with policies that favour local agriculture and examples of small scale farmers such as Denis La France, Jean Martin Fortier, Coop Tourne-sol.

Coaticook in the Eastern Townships was simply the best place where we could find all the elements we needed for starting our project: affordable land for rent, an agricultural school with a program in horticulture, expert advice from technicians and agronomists, and, most importantly, an open and generous group of producers willing to teach and share their experiences with others.

Lampe: How did your education at CRIFA prepare you for your current project? Are your earlier interests and studies relevant to what you are doing today?

JP: I have a B.Sc. in Biology from Columbia and an extensive background and experience in wildlife conservation, protected areas and sustainable agro-ecosystems. In my work with many individuals

and organizations ranging from public to the private to NGO's to local communities, I encountered many barriers in the way we relate to rural communities. Normally, we just demand from them responsibility towards the environment but we do not necessarily recognize that rural communities are the producers of our food supply – they are the very base of our society.

I decided to forward my career into organic farming simply because I consider that in terms of environmental conservation it is the most important job to be done at the moment. We moved to Canada with the idea of learning about farming and starting our own project of organic produce. In 2013-14, I completed a Certificate in Ecological Agriculture at McGill University and then moved back to Coaticook in July 2014 to begin a "DEP en production Horticole" at CRIFA.

In summary, all our personal and professional experiences have brought us to our project "Via Colibri". We love our work knowing that organic production is extremely important and meaningful here in the Eastern Townships.

Lampe: What kind of supervision/mentoring did you have when you were starting out?

JP: During the first two years of our project the support we received includes great courses at McGill and CRIFA, expert advice from technicians and professional agronomists, practical solutions to everyday challenges in a farm as well as financial support from various institutions at the provincial, regional and NGO levels. We would like to acknowledge our teachers from CRIFA, Renaud-Pierre Boucher, Lucy Choquette and Nataly Lanoix for all their help and great advice; our friends and mentors, James Sheldon and Myriam Fortier, owners of "Les jardins de l'arpenteuse" in Ayer's Cliff; and finally, we would like to thank organizations such as CIARC, CLD Coaticook and the Lampe Foundation for their constant support and goodwill towards our project.

Lampe: What advice would you like to have had when you were starting out?

JP: Looking back on our journey, we think as entrepreneurs we should have spent more time and energy in the development of the marketing strategies for our project. In 2016, we plan to achieve our goal of 25 baskets and participation in 2 local farmer's markets.

Lampe: How can the Lampe Foundation encourage young people to go into agriculture?

JP: We believe that networking would be a very effective way to help young people build their entrepreneurial capacities in agriculture. For example, agriculture students can benefit from a Lampe Foundation stimulus to participate in the "Guelph Organic Conference" or participate in a field visit organized by "Equiterre". Participation in this type of event improves the network capacity of the student and provides them with specific tools to succeed in their field of interest.

*John Poveda was the first recipient of the Lampe-Tillotson Agricultural Award in 2014. John and his family started a small-scale, bio-agricultural project 'Via Colibri' in Coaticook that sells organic vegetable baskets throughout the summer months.


Our Financial Summary


