OUR MISSION

We are dedicated to encouraging women and men from the Eastern Townships and across Canada to continue their education in order to improve their own lives and the wellbeing of the Townships community. We offer financial and mentoring support to students who have demonstrated their ability to become leaders in their community, and to those who are training to become health care professionals in the Townships.

Dear Stakeholders,

As President of the Lampe Foundation, it is heartwarming for me to hear the many success stories of our scholarship winners and how appreciative they are of the financial support they have received that has contributed to their educational successes. Lampe Foundation donors have continued to donate to maintain the sustainability of Lampe awards.

In 2024, Lampe initiated the Rural Opportunity Scholarship because of its very successful 30 for 30 campaign. The first scholarship was awarded at our Spring Awards in May 2024. As well, the Melissa Bowman-Pieters Scholarship in Athletics was established in 2024. This scholarship is for a student pursuing their post-secondary education (CEGEP or university) and has a passion for varsity sports. The first scholarship will be awarded in May 2025.

From the beginning, the Lampe Foundation has awarded scholarships and bursaries to young women and men at several levels of education from high school to university. In 1993, four awards were given out valued at just over \$1000; in 2024, 52 awards were handed out valued at over \$61,000. More than half of the awards were in the health sector largely thanks to the generous donation from the Sherbrooke Hospital Foundation in 2008. As a result, the number of future physicians, nurses, orderlies, social workers, physiotherapists and occupational therapists, and others in healthcare are being strengthened at a time when medical shortages continue to mount across the health spectrum.

The members of CFUW Sherbrooke & District are the greatest supporters and donors of the Lampe Foundation. The list of visionary women, Eastern Townships families and organizations who have made major contributions to the success of their charitable foundation is lengthy. They continue to feel a great sense of pride and derive immense satisfaction as it continues to recognize the noteworthy students of the Eastern Townships and beyond.

Thanks to the generosity of the Sherbrooke Record, we have been able to continue showcasing our scholarship winners in December and May. Lampe is also very appreciative of our partners who help make possible several of Lampe's scholarships, namely, The Tillotson Coaticook Region Fund, Richmond Regional High School, Phelps Help, North Hatley Village Improvement Society, Alexander Galt Regional High School, CFUW Sherbrooke & District and Université de Sherbrooke, who endure as important financial contributors to the success of Lampe. In addition, Lampe has been pleased to collaborate with families wishing to preserve the memory of a cherished loved one. I hope that you enjoy reading our 2024 Report to the Community. A Tribute to Dian Nusgart Cohen, C.M., O.M. (1932-2025)



"Come to the common room tonight to meet a speaker who explains compound interest in plain English." Those were the words of my Bishop's roommate in1965. I went. The speaker was Dian Cohen, and my roommate was right.

Several members of the current Lampe Foundation were teenagers then. We and our parents grew up with Dian. As an economics and business commentator, she brought depth of understanding of business complexities to a new level. Some of you will remember Dian as the author of the Royal Bank Newsletter. Perhaps, her syndicated columns in Maclean's magazine or

her morning voice on CJAD, CBC or CTV will be your memories. To her dying day, she continued to advise individuals, groups and company boards on financial matters. Her last column in the Sherbrooke Record appeared on May 13, 2025, a week after she died. She often made the comment, "I knew I was better at teaching and communicating economics than being an economist."

Born in Manitoba, she has lived and worked in Toronto, Montreal, New York and Hatley in the Eastern Townships. She has spent most of her life in Quebec: she brought her young family to Hatley in 1975 because she thought it would be "a good place to live." The Eastern Townships community is richer from her presence.

Since her 65th birthday Dian continued to throw herself into projects that give back to the Quebec and Eastern Townships community, the same community that she informed and energized during her 35-year career in broadcasting. As Director of several corporations, chair of fund-raising organizations, guiding force behind scholarship and hospital foundations, and founder of the Massawippi Valley Health Centre, she continued to contribute substantially to the community. Known as the queen of governance, Dian also embraced change and was never risk-averse.

During the 1990's and into the 2000's, Dian was instrumental in broadening the reach of the Lampe Scholarship Foundation and overseeing its substantial growth. In 2008, Dian worked with the Sherbrooke Hospital Foundation to guide their decision-making on dispersal of considerable funds. With her leadership, Lampe, the scholarship foundation of CFUW Sherbrooke & District, received a substantial injection of funds to finance Townshippers entering the health sector who commit to remain in the Townships. The generous funds transformed Lampe. Annually, the Foundation now awards over \$50,000 to students, mainly Townshippers, in a wide variety of fields and levels of education. Dian often said of her outreach, "It is time to pay it forward by educating the next generation."

During this time, Dian founded an Investment Club for the Sherbrooke and District branch of Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW). In monthly meetings, Dian expertly mentored a group of 20 women who benefitted from her financial insights. The women learned about estate planning, budgetary practices and investment strategies while managing a growing portfolio of stocks. Dian continued to bring depth of understanding on financial matters to the lay person.

As a community builder, Dian's role in Café Main Street deserves special mention. Inaugurated in Dian's 68th year in the Ayer's Cliff, Quebec community of less than 1000 residents, it became a community meeting centre for individuals and groups. Parishioners, walking groups, farmers' guilds, library associations, and literary societies, among others, travelled from near and far to meet at the coffee shop. Senior men, who are not joiners and who might otherwise languish in isolation, would stop by morning and afternoon to engage in conversation. Such conversations were in French or English or some combination of both. Building on her notable achievements in the world of large organizations and corporations, Dian increased community engagement in a rural bilingual community with a cozy coffee shop, complete with fireplace.

One of her last and largest community building projects was the founding of the Massawippi Valley Health Centre (CSVM) and the Massawippi Valley Health Foundation (FSVM). Still energetic and motivated at age 82 in 2012, she delved into learning all she could about health care, something new for her. Dian had a special concern for the health of the rural population of the Massawippi Valley. Prevention of disease and promotion of health were top of mind for Dian. In 2015, CSVM opened its doors with doctors, nurses, and staff in place. FSVM supports CSVM and is actively engaged in promoting the health and well-being of citizens of the Massawippi Valley and beyond.

In conclusion, generations of Canadians will be forever grateful to the visionary Dian Cohen, a truly gifted woman and community builder with multiple abilities. To the Lampe Foundation and citizens of the Eastern Townships, Dian was a leader and friend who left an epic legacy for all of us.


